Plural and Possessive 's'

Plural 's': Plural means more than one. The letter 's' can be added to many nouns to form a plural e.g. cat + s = cats.

Possessive 's': The letter 's' at the end of a word can be used with an apostrophe to show belonging e.g. the dog's bone, the girls' coats.
