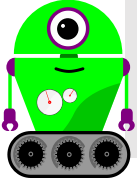


Relative Clauses



A relative clause is used to give extra information about a noun in a sentence. Relative clauses come straight after the noun that they are referring to and are introduced by a relative pronoun such as who, which, where, when or that.
